The Street

The street is neither in the city center nor on its outskirts. Hidden away somewhere in between, it doesn't draw tourists. Yet everything that can happen to people happens here.

A boy aims with his slingshot. Another is overcome by his own anger. A consortium tries to empty a tenement block. The tenants plan their resistance. The street festival needs planning. The city officials go out to lunch. The antiquarian battles mold, sunlight, bookworms, and fire. The florist falls in love. The homeless man dies outdoors; the elderly aunt in the nursing home. An apocryphal saint and the people behind their windows bear witness. Pigeons fall from the sky.

Worry shakes the residents, longing drives them out into the night, and love makes them lose their minds. Their paths cross every day, but how much do they really know about one another? In his new novel, Robert Seethaler weaves their stories into a mosaic of moments—and thus, a mosaic of life itself.

A rediscovery of a forgotten 20th century masterpiece.

Iwan Heilbut was born in Hamburg in 1898. His first two novels, *Triumph der Frau* (Horenverlag, 1928) and *Frühling in Berlin* (Ullstein, 1932), brought him literary acclaim. After the Nazi rise to power, Heilbut was briefly imprisoned before fleeing to Paris finally reaching the safety in the United States. His exile novel *Birds of Passage* (*Zugvögel/Die Überlebenden*) was published in a heavily abridged English translation in 1943. Heilbut returned to Germany in 1950. He continued to revise the novel until his death in 1972 but it was never published in German.

Birds of Passage

Paris, Quartier Latin, 1939: The looming threat of war is beginning to shape daily life, even within the apartment building where Edvard and Rahel, refugees from Nazi Germany, have found a sense of community among French and foreign residents. Rahel is expecting a child, most loved and happily awaited by his parents. After being denounced by a neighbor, the couple move to a hotel inhabited solely by immigrants, where their son is born.

With the start of the French campaign, Edvard must report for internment and is separated from his family. In a camp dubbed “La macabre”, the prisoners are held under inhumane conditions.

Eventually Edvard is able to flee the camp and orchestrates his family’s escape first to Marseille, then via Spain to Lisbon, and after a long wait for American visas, they finally board a ship to New York, where Edvard is reunited with several former fellow inmates, each facing an uncertain future.

Birds of Passage is a densely woven and deeply moving novel of exile, distinguished by its authenticity and psychological nuance that stands out above all for its literary quality.

Who Would Not Want To Stay In Life

In 1985, a young pianist takes her own life in a small GDR town. Three and a half decades later, the writer Helene Bukowski encounters Christina’s story and approaches it with tender, meticulous care.

She accompanies the child from Leipzig to Neubrandenburg, gets to know a father whose view of his daughter is clouded by his own ambitions, a mother whose photographic eye is good at seeing but who never learned to speak up, and a piano that sits immovably in their apartment. She follows Christina to Berlin, to the special school for music with its cold practice rooms and daily drill, and later, to the Moscow Conservatory. In small, piercing scenes, she shows how life is taken from Christina long before she steps out the window. Her selfhood is narrowed and overwritten by the demands of virtuosity, by her father’s projections, and by a political system hungry for victories.

Bukowski attempts to restore to Christina a dignity that the state she lived in and family myth have denied. The book braids documentary traces of Christina’s life with the author’s imaginative reconstructions, letting them test and unsettle each other, and preserves Christina’s individuality in uncertainty, in question marks, alternative scenes, and carefully signposted speculation. The result is a work of rare moral intelligence and aesthetic precision that will resonate deeply with readers of authors like Annie Ernaux, Rachel Cusk, and Jenny Erpenbeck.



Helene Bukowski studied at the Hildesheim Literary Institute. Her debut novel *Milk Teeth* was published in 2019 and adapted for cinema. *The Warrior* followed in 2022. Her books have been widely reviewed and translated into several languages. Today, she lives as a freelance writer in Berlin.

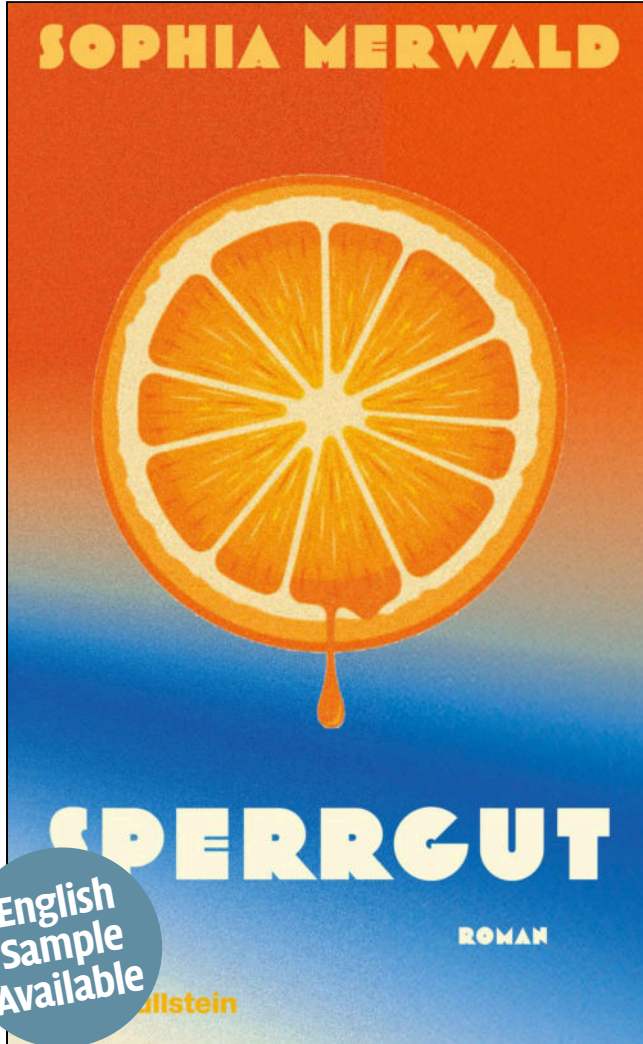

Outsize

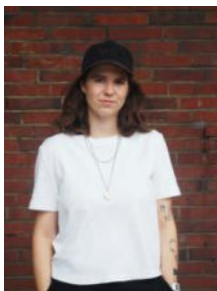
At the beginning there is Nana Crystal who builds a house on a derelict industrial site, and the “Lusthansa”, as she calls it, becomes a home for women who have none. Years later, under the care of Nana Crystal and her partner Bruno, a new community takes shape there: Three generations live together, share paprika soup, watch Astro TV together, and look out for one another. Until the nearby city shows up with a demolition order and the “Lusthansa” has to fight for its existence.

Taking the term “safe space” literally, *Sperrgut* explores a community that rehearses living together remote from society and celebrates queer sexuality. For her story that moves between systemic critique, utopia, and postmodern mythmaking, Sophia Merwald invents her own, unique language: lyrical and playful, yet razor-sharp in observation, surreal and at the same time deeply truthful.

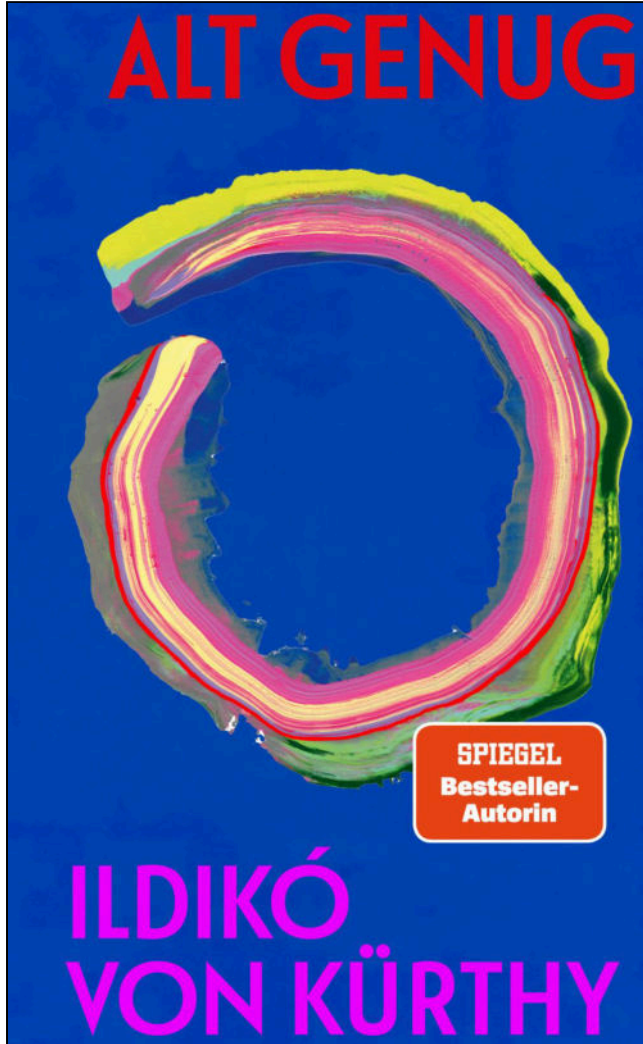

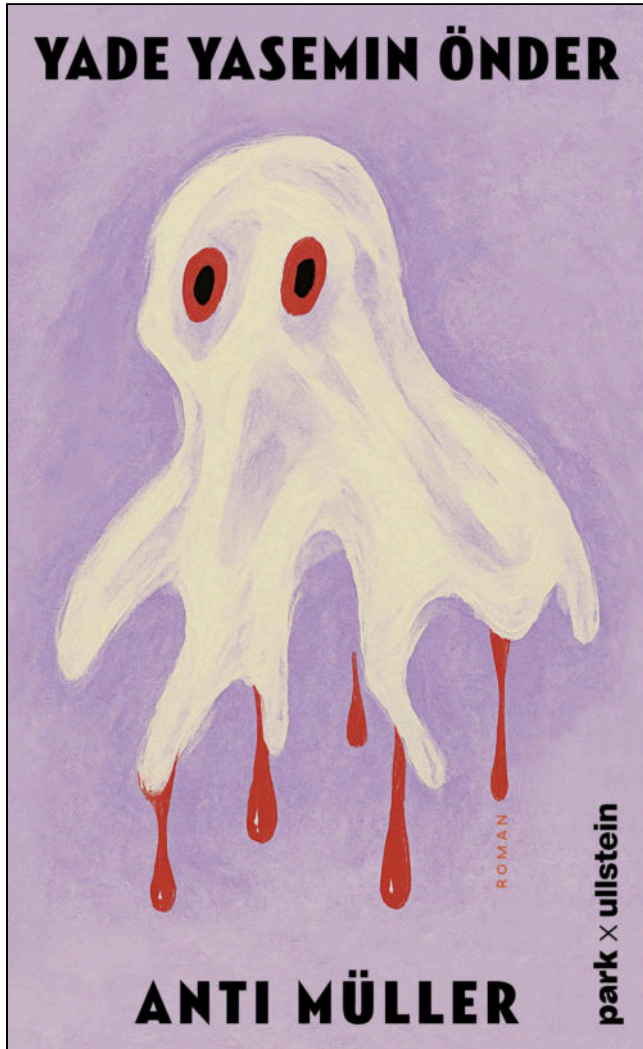

Beware the Zeitgeist

Beware the Zeitgeist is a radical contemporary novel that captures a single day of profound contrast. On February 6, 2023, while a devastating double earthquake brings absolute catastrophe to southeastern Anatolia and northern Syria, it is just another ordinary day in Zurich.

The news reaches the novel's nameless narrator in her Zurich apartment, and her thoughts immediately travel to her grandmother and mother, both of whom originate from the affected region. Structured in 24 cantos, one for each hour of the day, the narrative delves not only into her family's history of immigration and farewells but also into the narrator's own fractured present. The past intrudes further when the great love she lost a year ago reaches out to express condolences. Just as the earth cracks open in Anatolia, this message shatters her own emotional armor.

Every canto is a stylistic experiment in itself shifting from newspaper jargon to the script of an academic lecture. Each masterfully employs stream of consciousness, intertextuality, and multilingualism. The result is a portrait of a heroine full of contradictions: a cosmopolitan and a migrant who doesn't want to be modern, yet in her struggle, couldn't be anything but.



Hayat Erdoğan is a dramaturg, curator, and columnist. She studied German, English, and Dramaturgy, was a research fellow at the James Joyce Foundation in Zurich and Trieste, a lecturer at the Zurich University of the Arts, and led artistic, research-based projects between London and Hong Kong. From 2019 to 2025, she was co-director and dramaturg at the Theater Neumarkt in Zurich. *Beware the Zeitgeist* (*Hauptsache kein Zeitgeist*) is her debut novel.

School is over. Marko and Claire are a couple, but both sense their relationship is nearing its end. Marko, top of his class, still falls short of his dream to study medicine. Claire just wants out—out of their small town, into the real life everyone talks about. Marko, meanwhile, is stuck between TikTok and future anxiety in a bleak apartment block that smells of wet dog and lemon cleaner. Only when his father Igor reveals his mother's inheritance a way out appears: an expensive medical program in Hungary, paid for with everything they have. But instead of leaving together, Marko and Claire run in opposite directions. The further they drift apart, the more they lose control—until everything is hurled into the air, and nothing is as it was.

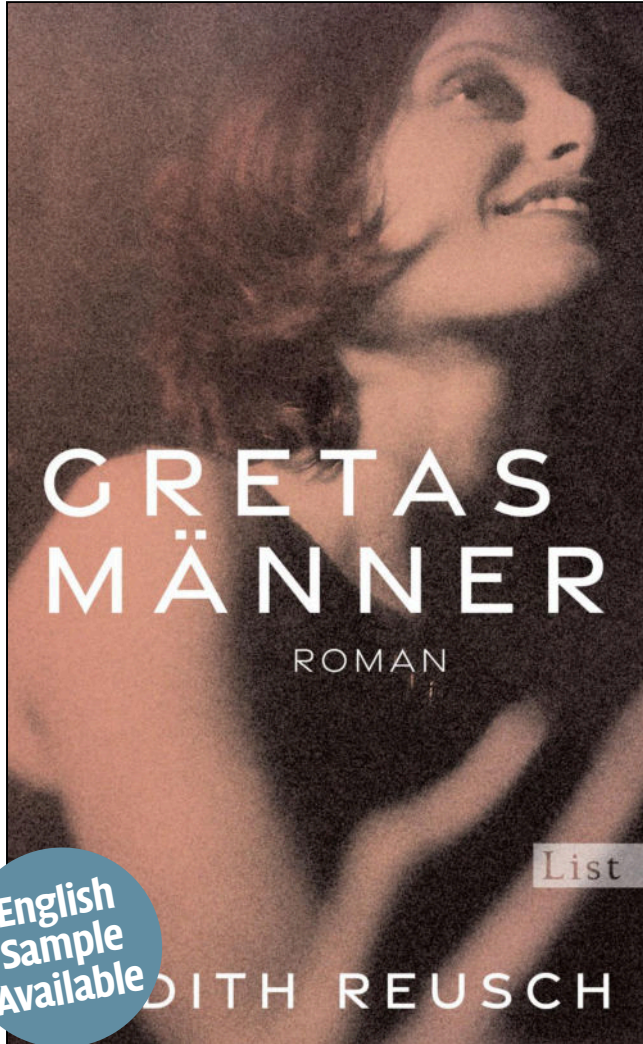

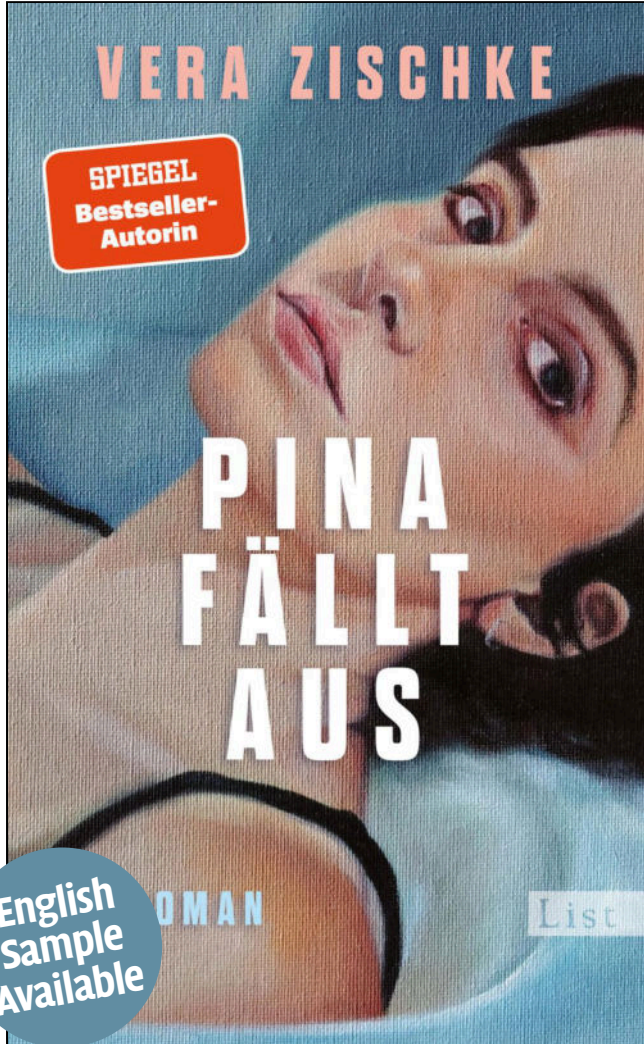

Pina Is Out Of Action

When Pina collapses in the middle of the intersection, she has only one thought: Who will take care of Leo now? Her son is twenty years old and lives in a world of his own — a world only Pina understands. In the morning, he won't get out of bed until a green bubble rises in his lava lamp. When he walks up stairs, he does it in his own rhythm: always two steps forward and one step back. The other residents of the house don't understand the strange young man. Sixteen-year-old school dropout Zola, the resigned recluse Wojtek, and the world-weary senior Inge already have enough on their own plates. But now Pina is in the intensive care unit, and Leo is alone in the apartment for the first time. The neighbors are in shock. They surely can't be responsible for him! But Leo needs them. And as this unlikely group stumbles through an entirely new daily routine, each one of them realizes: they need Leo, too.



Vera Zischke trained as a journalist and, after many years as a reporter, believed nothing human could surprise her anymore. Then she had three children – and realized the real adventure was only just beginning. Her debut novel *Ava Awakens* was recommended thousands of times on social media and thus became a secret bestseller. On Instagram, under @verazischke, she speaks out against unrealistic ideals of motherhood, writes about her life as a “tired writing mom,” and sometimes also about being a caregiving parent. She continues to work as a newspaper editor.

Markus Gabriel is the Chair for Epistemology, Modern and Contemporary Philosophy and Director of the International Centre for Philosophy at the University of Bonn. He is director of the interdisciplinary Center for Science and Thought and a regular visiting professor at the Sorbonne (Paris 1) and the New School for Social Research in New York City. Ethical Intelligence

As large language models become everyday companions, the AI revolution has revealed that its most profound effects are not technological but emotional. It transforms how we relate, think, and understand ourselves. Humanity stands before what amounts to a magic mirror. We need philosophical guidance that runs deeper than technological introduction.

This is where internationally renowned philosopher Markus Gabriel's concept of "ethical intelligence" comes into play. As he explains: "Ethical intelligence is not a state, but a practice: It emerges wherever people use AI systems not for enforcement, but for understanding; where they don't replace relationships through technology, but deepen relationships through technology." With this change of perspective—no longer ethics against AI, but ethics through AI—a danger becomes a companion.

Gabriel's vision offers a compelling alternative to both the complete deregulation championed by tech giants and the overregulation often heralded by careful state agents. We can establish a humane, values-based AI as a market-effective reality in its own right, driving both moral progress and long-term economic growth.

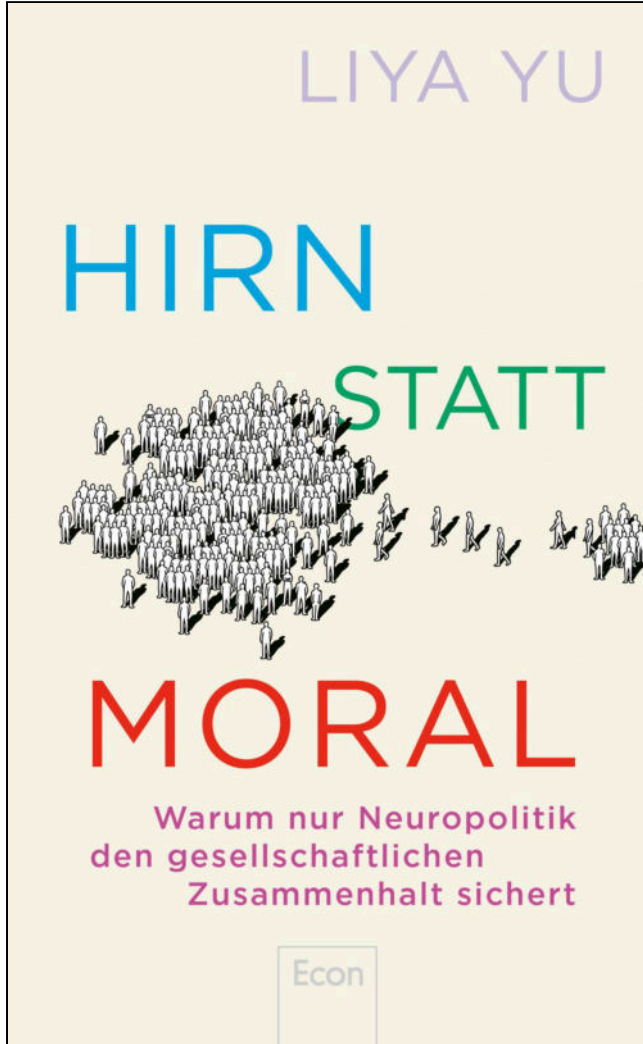

On talk shows, in political debates, at the dinner table: “victims” are a hot topic. However, the word is not used to name those who have suffered injustice anymore. Instead, it is aimed at those who disturb a perceived peace, are deemed soft, drag others down, or supposedly want to put themselves above everyone else. “Victim” has become an accusation. If people would just stop whining so much, the argument goes, we wouldn’t have so many problems. What happens to our society when sensitivity is dismissed as elitist, while “might makes right” is celebrated as egalitarian and authentic?

In her new book, Alice Hasters traces a media-amplified cultural shift that is no coincidence and that goes hand in hand with the resurgence of authoritarianism and fascism.
